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Farmington Elementary is Rooted in Community

Last fall Heidi Schmitz, a Farmington Elementary School teacher, was inspired to try something different in the lead-up to the 2018-2019 school year. She, along with colleagues Jen Venz, Vicki Giegerich, and Marna Phinney, began planning a surprise for FES staff and families. They set the goal of visiting the home of each student before the beginning of the school year.

"Part of our mission statement is creating connections that empower meaningful relationships with students, their families, and our community," said Farmington Elementary School Principal Kim Bollesen, "so we wanted to kick off the year in a way to build community and relationships."

The small group of teachers planned all spring and summer. "In the spring we made a timeline and a vision of how we wanted the day to go," said Jen Venz, Farmington Elementary School counselor. Over the summer they found sponsors for special t-shirts to wear during the event, designed the shirts, collected t-shirt sizes, planned welcome bags for families, organized food for staff, divided staff members into groups, created routes and assigned homes to each staff group, and prepared to present the idea to the FES staff during their August workshop.

Most importantly, they kept the whole thing a secret from both staff and families all summer long. "The staff were a bit shocked and hesitant at first but afterwards they talked about what an amazing experience it was," said Venz. "The teachers were able to gain a new perspective on where our students live, from how long some kids have to ride the bus to who all lives by each other," she continued.

Teachers were paired with colleagues from different grade levels and enjoyed getting to know their fellow FES teachers better. In addition to current teachers, paraprofessionals, Kid Connection teachers, and retired teachers were invited to join the visits. "Our mission statement is about being rooted in tradition as we continue to grow so we thought it would be fitting to have them join us," said Venz.

Most families were pleasantly surprised to receive a special visit from their child's school.



"The families seemed to be really touched that we made the effort to get to each child's house and some were surprised we would show up when they didn't live directly in town," said Venz. Not everyone was home to receive their visit, of course, but they did their best to meet all families and went back to catch anyone they missed when possible. Overall, it was a successful endeavor that resulted in a stronger school community,

"The smiles and great experiences were worth every minute of time that was spent preparing for it," said Principal Bollesen.



Riding for Focus at Boeckman Middle School

Boeckman Middle School has been chosen as one of the select nationwide schools to receive a grant from The Specialized Foundation to begin the Riding for Focus cycling program. The Riding for Focus program integrates cycling into school curriculum as a way to help students achieve academic, health, and social success. Jackie Jensen-Gordon, a physical education and health teacher at BMS, applied for the grant and will be incorporating the program into her classes during the 2018-2019 school year.

"In addition to 36 new schools across the nation, we are delighted to have Boeckman Middle School join The Specialized Foundation family," said Ted Theocheung, CEO of The Specialized Foundation. "With this year's additional schools, our foundation will reach over 20,000 students, across 77 schools, in 30 states. We look forward to working closely with Boeckman Middle School to improve their students' lives through cycling."

As a recipient of this year's grant, BMS gained access to the Riding for Focus program curriculum, a fleet of bikes, a starter maintenance kit, and helmets to activate the program. Additionally, Jensen-Gordon attended an in-person training hosted by The Specialized Foundation to ensure success as the program is integrated into classrooms this fall.

"We are so fortunate and excited to have this opportunity to offer a cycling program at Boeckman Middle School. Our hope is that by getting more kids on bikes, spending time in the outdoors, and providing more opportunities for

physical activity, our students at BMS will achieve better academically, improve their health and fitness, and find a lifelong activity that they enjoy," said Jensen-Gordon.

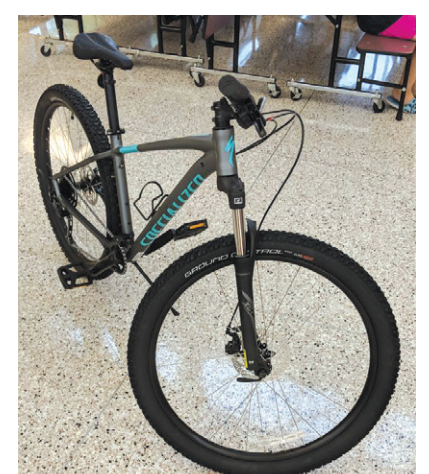
Additionally, Boeckman Middle School partnered with local bike shop Erik's Bike, Board, and Ski in Burnsville, MN to help build and maintain the school bike fleet. "Erik's has been awesome to work with and is willing to help with any and all aspects of this program. Their expertise and guidance will help make this program strong, and we are thrilled to work with this local business," said Jensen-Gordon.

Riding for Focus is designed to introduce middle school students to cycling's positive effects on academic performance, health, and social success. The curriculum was developed based on studies conducted by a third-party research organization that investigated the impact of cycling on middle school students. Students that follow the curriculum have seen improvements in their standardized test scores, and the



increased physical activity helps to establish lifelong habits for exercise, fitness, and wellness.

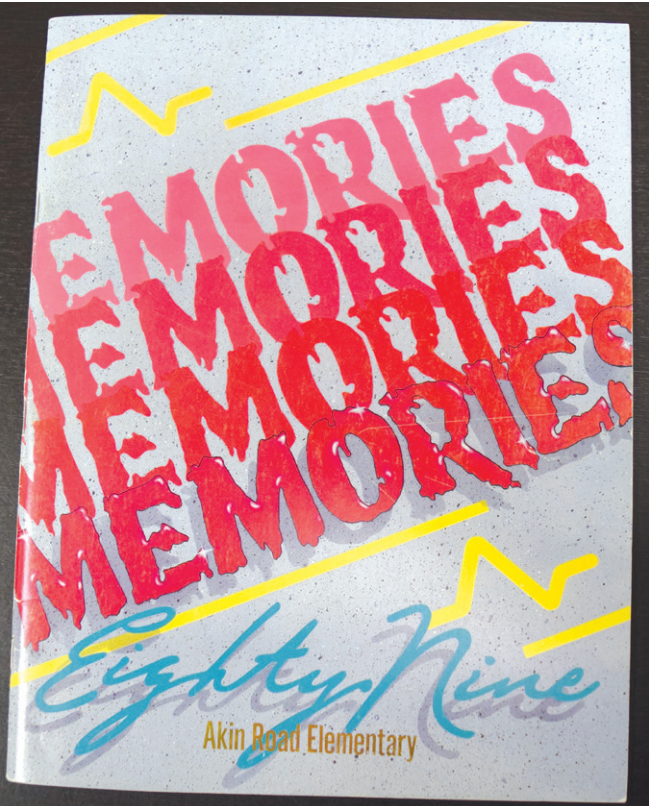
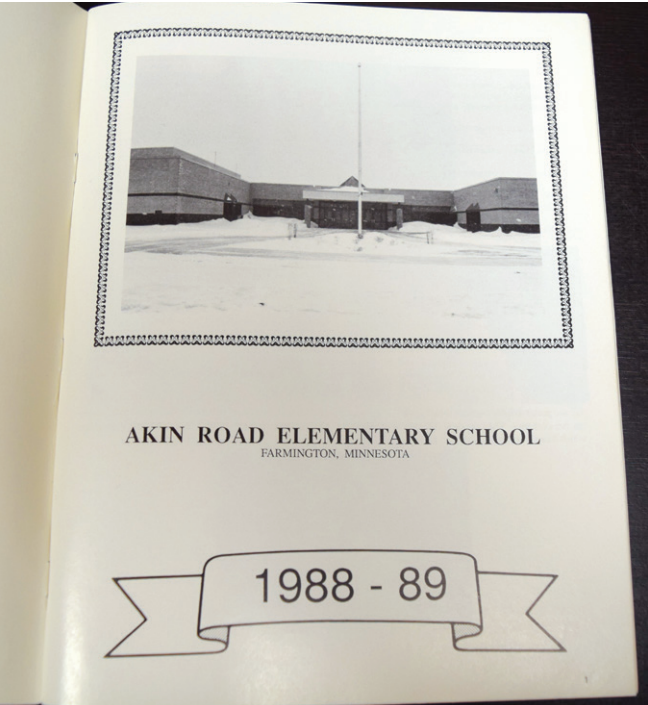
Akin Road Celebrates 30 Years!

This fall, Akin Road Elementary School is celebrating 30 years of educating children from Farmington and the surrounding area. The building opened in 1988. It was the fourth school building and the second dedicated elementary school in District 192.

In 1988 the science lab and a music room were new additions to the elementary program. They doubled the number of computers in the lab from 15 to 30 Apple II GS's - all networked! The library boasted electronic check-out, card catalog, and inventory. Despite these modern amenities, when asked what they liked best about the new building students replied, "the carpeting, the sky lights, and we each have our own locker."

Doug Henke was the first principal of the school and he wrote this for the 1988-89 yearbook: "We are proud to have a school which is one of the very best buildings anywhere. We are also fortunate to have the teachers we have. They are definitely the best anywhere. And, it's exciting to be living in a growing community which has the advantage of being close to everything while still retaining a small-town friendliness." These things are still true today.

Meadowview Begins With Kinder Krew

This fall kindergarten began a little differently at Meadowview Elementary School than it has in past years. Instead of attending a full day of school on September 4th like the first through fifth grade students, Meadowview kindergarten students were invited to attend a shortened preview day with a parent, guardian, or special adult called Kinder Krew!

By creating Kinder Krew, Meadowview teachers hoped to build positive, lasting relationships and ease the transition into kindergarten. The goal of the day was to familiarize students and parents with their teacher, the school building, the classroom, and the daily routines. "This is a chance to slow down and personalize a day for our littlest. It gives a chance for families to see our classroom, see the school, and ask questions in a smaller environment. We want families to feel welcome and engaged in their child's education," said Julie Sieben, a Meadowview Elementary kindergarten teacher.

According to Meadowview School Counselor Jackie Brand, the day was a huge success: "I usually spend most of the first week with anxious kindergarteners and we've had so very few. I would say we'll definitely do it again!"

Gateway Students Receive Drone

Last school year, two Gateway Academy students, Blake and TJ, began a personal project focused on drones - how they work and their uses in the world around them. Through this project they researched how a drone functions and began fundraising to obtain a drone for educational purposes. Thanks to generous donations from the community, they received the funding they needed and their drone arrived just prior to the new school year!

According to Blake and TJ, "Our project idea is to teach our peers how drones can help with learning purposes.... We have things like the history, different types, and many more topics on drones. In order for students to fly the drone they would have to go through a training course led by us.... Drones can also help students understand the laws of flight, physics, and other real world concepts."

When the drone arrived Tim Schlatter, a Gateway Academy learning advisor, tweeted, "Thanks to all that donated to this student-led project! The students will be beyond excited!"

MAAP accreditation is the ultimate indicator of quality in out-of-school-time programs. 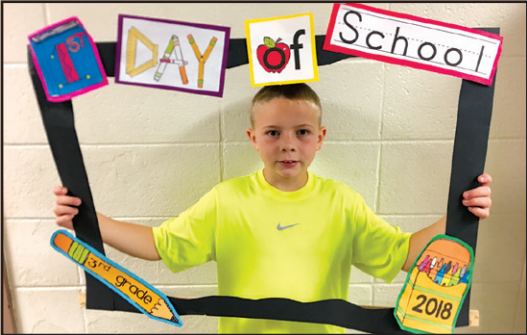

Farmington High School

Farmington High School transformed two spaces for students. First, they took an old storage room and turned it into an athletic room aimed at strength training, which has been nicknamed “The Jungle”. Second, they turned an unused locker bay into a common area with flexible seating and iPad charging stations. Students and teachers were excited to use the new spaces as the school year began.

Boeckman Middle School

Boeckman Middle School also redid a common area to make it more learning friendly. They took a large area and designated spaces for small group work (Pair ‘N Share), large group work (The Hub), quiet reflection (The Think Tank), and Brainstorming (Inspiration Station). The space remains open, with a variety of seating options, so that it can be easily rearranged to students’ needs throughout the school year.



Dodge Middle School

Dodge Middle School began the year with a more relaxed space for students to work together or individually. The common area has trendy lighting and seating options. Students have said it feels a little like working in a coffee shop - they love it! Over the summer, updates were also made to the DMS Media Center. On its 25th anniversary, Dodge Middle School feels bright and fresh.



Akin Road Elementary School

Akin Road Elementary has a new third grade learning space. Individual classrooms are separated by folding walls that keep noise out when closed but are easily moved for collaboration between classes. 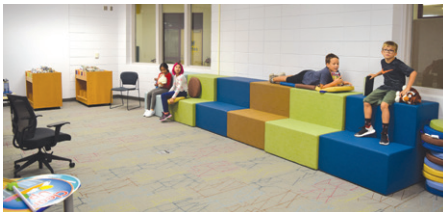
Farmington Elementary School

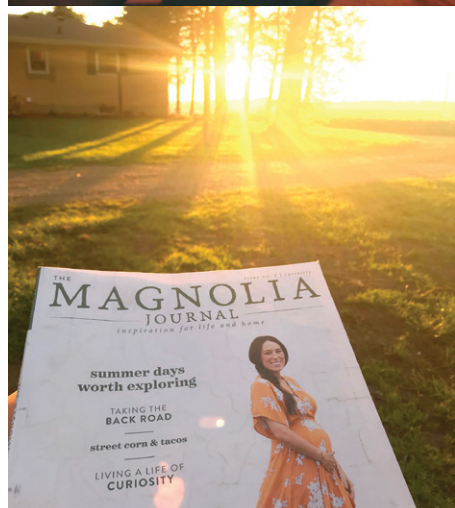

Over the summer, Riverview Elementary teachers and students made it a point to keep reading and promote literacy in their community. They shared some pictures with us of their favorite summer reading spots.



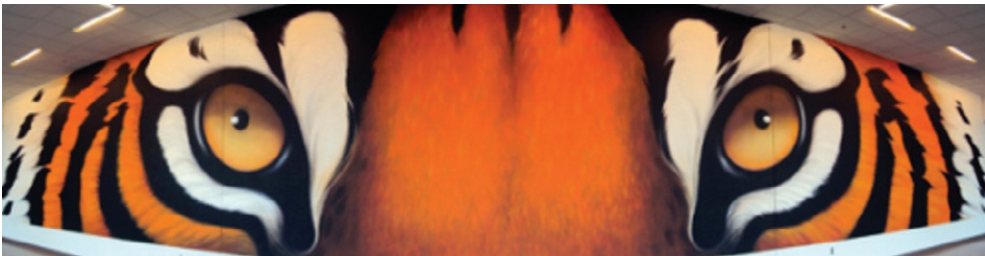
Into the Woods
